## Department of Home Affairs

The Department of Home Affairs provides key public services, including the Administration, law enforcement, immigration management, and emergency response. To implement these functions effectively, the department works through four sub-departments: Public Administration, Karenni State Police, Immigration, and Emergency and Rescue. These sub-departments coordinate to deliver public services directly to communities across the state.

The objectives of the Department of Home Affairs are,

- To establish people-centered governance at the Karenni State level during the interim period, with the participation of all stakeholders, in accordance with federal democratic principles.
- To assist in addressing the basic needs of the people, including security, social welfare, education, healthcare, and administrative management.
- To prevent and respond to the various dangers and crises currently occurring through the administrative mechanism.

The Summary of the implementation of activities for the 2025 fiscal year is as follows.

### (A)The Public Administration Sub-department

During the year 2025, the Public Administration Sub-department has been implementing an administrative mechanism that includes the participation of the Karenni people and all relevant stakeholders. It has carried out activities such as drafting policy frameworks related to local governance and supervising, guiding, and inspecting the office operations of Township Administrative Committees/Councils.

On the other hand, as this is the capacity-building time, the Karenni People's Administration Training School (KPA) operated and trained 23 trainees of Batch No. (1) with teaching on the subjects of administration.

As part of regional development projects, the repair of inter-village roads and the construction of bridges were carried out in collaboration with civil society organizations and donors.




## (B) Karenni State Police Sub-department

The Sub-department of Karenni State Police is carrying out public security and service functions through its headquarters, 17 area police stations, and police posts.

In law enforcement, a total of 171 cases were handled in 2025. Among these, 114 cases have been sentenced, 21 cases are currently under trial, and 16 cases are still under police investigation. There are a total of 20 cases with case termination, settlement, or withdrawal.

In addition, legal action was taken in 27 cases involving violence against women and children, resulting in prison sentences being imposed and the placement transfer to a youth rehabilitation center.

To improve road safety and the protection of local communities, awareness sessions were organized for the public on traffic rules and road safety, and informational pamphlets were distributed in crowded and high-traffic areas. Security and public service functions are being carried out daily at joint inspection checkpoints in cooperation with local revolutionary forces.



## (c) The Immigration Sub-department

The Immigration Sub-department carried out the collection of household population registration forms (FAa Hta Sa-1) for the 167,319 residents and 100,374 internally displaced persons (IDPs), for a total of 267,693 people. They also conducted entry and exit screening at border and checkpoint gates, issued the 3,926 Interstate Travel Passes (IP) for travelling, and issued the verification temporary residence documents for 3,029 workers. and Border Crossing Passes (BP) for cross-border travel. At border checkpoints, 4,601 arrival individuals and 5,910 departure individuals were systematically screened.

The socio-economic data of 96,984 people on the ground were collected through a socio-economic survey in (8) townships.



## (D) The Emergency and Rescue Sub-department

During 2025, a total of 1,159 civilians from conflict-affected areas and more than 1,000 internally displaced persons were assisted and relocated to safe places. In addition, 85 injured individuals and emergency patients were transported to relevant hospitals and clinics. The Fire Department, together with residents, cooperated in extinguishing fire incidents, including fuel station fires. Furthermore, about 240,000 gallons of water were distributed to 44 IDP camps, with approximately 150 deliveries, and 200 basic rescue trainees and 20 driver trainees were successfully trained.

## Department of Education

Following the 2021 coup, Karenni State experienced a serious collapse of education, and to overcome and address this crisis, the Department of Education carried out its activities to establish a federal democratic education system and deliver quality education services with the efforts of CDM teachers. The objectives of department are as follow,

- To ensure the right to education and equal access for all.
- To establish a guaranteed and quality education system.
- To implement a mother tongue-based multilingual education system.
- To develop an inclusive, compulsory, and free basic education system for all.
- To develop balance in Physical, intellectual, social, vocational, and spiritual development education system.
- To promote a quality education system by developing a strong curriculum, effective teaching methods, reliable assessment systems, and professional teachers.
- To grow knowledgeable, competent, and responsible youth who can contribute to building a federal democratic nation.
- To develop a student-centered education system that encourages independent, critical, and creative thinking, enabling students to solve problems on their own.

## **(A) The Basic Education Sub-department**

Under the Basic Education Sub-department, implemented activities include: constructing school buildings and basic infrastructure, the production and distribution of textbooks, drafting policy frameworks, capacity building, and providing support to teachers.

During the year, sanitary toilets were constructed for 30 schools, 10 tarpaulins were provided per township, and solar systems and generators were installed. In collaboration with Clean Yangon, a total of 10,240 sets of textbooks from KG to Grade 9 were distributed. In addition, thousands of Grade 12 textbooks (covering Myanmar, English, Mathematics, Science, and Arts subjects) were published and distributed to schools.

Furthermore, an Interim Basic Education Guideline and a School Registration Guideline were developed. Teacher capacity-building trainings (Pre-Service and In-Service) were conducted for 422 teachers and 92 school principals.

## **(B) The Higher Education Sub-department**

Workshops were conducted for drafting the charters for universities/colleges and to facilitate the establishment of a Higher Education Council. Scholarship Certificates were awarded to 52 Grade -12 students. In addition, the support for building materials and office equipment were support to the Technological University, the Medical College, and Karenni University of Nursing.

## **(C) The Livelihood Sub-department**

In the vocational education sector, educational materials were provide to the Karenni College of Social Sciences and Humanities and Kinnaree Education Center. Additionally, a policy for Technical and Vocational Education and Training for Karenni State was drafted. The Department of Education collaborated with partner organizations, including STF and Save the Children/MEC, to promote child safeguarding and ensure that children can learn in a safe and secure environment. Through June to December 2025, 4 cases of child-related incidents were addressed in coordination with the relevant judicial authorities and police forces.

State-level signing of the Child Safeguarding Code of Conduct (CSG COC) was implemented among staff, school administrative councils, and teachers. Recently, a total of 4,413 teachers have signed the Code of Conduct. Regarding networking meetings were held with international organizations such as the EU, World Bank, UNESCO, and UNICEF to present and discuss the Karenni education sector. The department has also been actively cooperating within the Ethnic State and Local Education Council (ESLC), with serving in the role of Chair.

Memorandum of Understanding (MOUs) were signed with organizations such as STF, Pink Jade, and RISE for education initiatives.



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## 2025 Annual Activity Report



### Department of Health

The Department of Health has been working on assessing public health care initiatives, disease prevention, and control activities to ensure healthcare services for the entire population of Karenni State. Throughout 2025, in collaboration with healthcare service providers who are working within Karenni State and local administrative authorities, the following services were delivered to the people.

#### (A) The Medical Treatment Service Sub-department

The Medical Treatment Sub-department provided hospital-level medical services as follows:

**Outpatients:** A total of 23,410 patients were treated, including 10,618 new outpatients.

**Inpatients:** There were 3,865 patients admitted for inpatient care.

**Surgeries:** 855 major surgeries and 1,106 minor surgeries.


**Obstetric surgeries:** 244 Caesarean sections (LSCS) cases.

#### (B) The Public Health Sub-department

The Public Health Sub-department provided basic healthcare services to rural areas and internally displaced persons (IDP) camps.

- **Clinic visits:** A total of 92,577 patients received treatment at fixed clinics.
- **Mobile medical services:** Mobile medical teams provided treatment to 43,474 patients.
- **Referrals:** 1,938 patients who required advanced medical care were referred to relevant hospitals.

#### Primary Health Care Service




## (C) Maternal and Child Health Care


Under Maternal, Newborn, and Child Health (MNCH) services, to reduce the death rate of maternal and child and to improve healthcare services, a total of 10,154 antenatal care (AN) visits were provided to pregnant women. There were 1,714 vaginal deliveries and 244 Caesarean section (LSCS) deliveries.

There was 1 maternal death, 24 newborn deaths, and 14 deaths of children under five years. There were a total of 173 miscarriage cases.

### Rehabilitation and Artificial Limb Services

At the rehabilitation center, services were provided to 52 new patients and 22 existing patients. A total of 52 individuals requiring artificial limbs were newly fitted, and prosthetic devices for 2 individuals were repaired.

### Issuing Birth Certificate

Birth certificates were issued by health officers across the 12 townships. A total of 2,159 birth certificates were issued in Pekon Township, which has the highest rate of issuing certificate among the other townships. The service was carried out across the whole Karenni State, including townships such as Demoso (East), Dephaung Khu, and Loi Nang Pha.

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## Department of Humanitarian Support and Rehabilitation

The Department of Humanitarian Support and Rehabilitation was established on September 7, 2023, to operate during the interim period to protect people's lives, properties, and livelihoods, to maintain the rule of law, deliver public services, and respond on time to meet the emergency needs of Karenni people. Furthermore, the Department implements its activities with the following aims:

- (a) To ensure that the entire Karenni population receives basic services and protection under human dignity.
- (b) To systematically identify, gather, and coordinate with the necessary resources to support basic services on time.
- (c) To properly develop as a department and provide quality services that meet the needs of the people.

### (A) Emergency Response

In order to ensure that supplies and food for emergency assistance and distribution were managed without waste and delivered on time, a total of eight warehouses were constructed in seven townships during 2025. Through the warehouses, food supplies, and shelter materials were distributed to 74,948 people from 17,769 households residing in 356 (IDP) camps across 11 townships.

Due to the security situation, emergency assistance, including shelter materials, toilet seats, and basic foods were also provided to 11,745 newly displaced persons. In addition, temporary shelters were constructed for 200 displaced households in Pekon, Dephaung Khu, Loi Nang Pha, and Demoso townships. Furthermore, drinking water was distributed to 31,053 people living in 81 villages and displacement camps that were affected by water shortages during the summer season.

Moreover, for 94 households (368 people) who voluntarily wished to return to their places of origin, the Department of Humanitarian Response (DoHR), in cooperation with the Ministry of Home Affairs, carried out necessary data collection and provided support for the returning process.

## **(B)Data of IDPs in Karenni State**

Due to armed conflict and natural disasters in Karenni State, the number of internally displaced persons increased from 126,124 in 2024 to 143,652 in June 2025. This shows an increase of more than 17,000 people, which is a significant challenge for supporting humanitarian assistance.

According to the data, there are 72,293 women, 3,101 children under the age of two, 9,482 elderly persons aged 60, and 1,452 persons with disabilities. As the number of vulnerable groups, particularly young children and the elderly, continues to grow, the demand for nutrition and medical supplies in humanitarian assistance also increasing.

## **(C) Civilian Safety and EWER Program**

The EWER (Early Warning, Early Response) awareness program aimed at reducing civilian risks, strengthening safety, and ensuring secure community environments from the impacts of armed conflict and natural disasters. The program was implemented in Loi Nan in Dephaung Khu township, Demoso (East) Townships, Pekon Township, and Nan Mae Khon Township.

A total of 50 training sessions were conducted under the topics of First Aid Training for Teachers, EWER Awareness for Teachers and Students, EWER Awareness for Communities, and EWER Awareness for Hospitals, reaching 2,340 participants, including teachers, students, and community members.

In addition, 20 bomb shelters were constructed for schools and hospitals, and air-raid safety was also practiced.

During 2025, with the collaboration of local public as well as the individual staff, the Department of Humanitarian Assistance and Rehabilitation made significant efforts in the areas of: make sure with its policies and strategies are effectively implemented at the township level, overseeing the effective use of the Early Warning and Early Response (EWER) system through coordination with civil society organizations, assisting people who are out of access to the regular support.

These accomplishments were made through the active participation and cooperation of both departmental staff and the public. Since its establishment, the Department has been committed to strengthening public services by formulating policies and strategies and implementing them with strong dedication and effort. For the future implementation, the Department will keep holding discussions with all relevant stakeholders as needed and will take the actions into practice.

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# Interim Executive Council of Karenni State Department of Planning, Finance and Taxation 2025 Annual Activity Report



## Department of Planning, Finance and Taxation

To deliver the service to the public and to be able to operate the administration, the Department of Planning, Finance, and Taxation is responsible for developing an estimated Budget Proposal and overseeing the systematic collection and management of public taxes, Fee and Customs Duty.

Before the formal Tax Law was enacted, taxation activities were carried out in accordance with the Terms of Reference (ToR) for Tax Administration. And, through quarterly coordination meetings between the Karenni State Interim Executive Council (IEC) and the Karenni State Joint Forces, taxation matters, security issues, and the management of joint checkpoints were discussed, decisions and future action plans were jointly formulated and implemented. By the end of this year, the Karenni State Consultative Council (KSCC) approved and released the Taxation Policy of Karenni State.



The Karenni State Interim Executive Council (IEC) is implementing the Bottom-up Participatory Planning approach, which planning begins at the grassroots level and moves upward through different administrative levels which reflects one of the (9) key principles outlined in the Chapter(4) of the Karenni Interim Policy, and the implementation apply areas are as follows:

- I. Women and Children’s Affairs Sector
- II. Youth Rights Sector
- III. Humanitarian Assistance and Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) Sector
- IV. Education Sector
- V. Health Sector
- VI. Persons with Disabilities and the Elderly Affairs Sector
- VII. Immediate Emergency Needs Sector

In order to ensure transparency, accountability, and systematic management in the use of public funds, the Karenni Interim Financial Management Policy (Financial Management Policy) was approved in February 2025. Following this, the revised and supplemented draft Financial Management Regulation (FMR) is currently under review for approval.

### (A) Planning Sub-department

The Planning Department was able to carry out activities such as developing local development projects, implementing project activities, and conducting capacity-building training related to local development. Coordination was also undertaken to support the development of local plans in 5 townships: Kalyer, Demoso (East), Phout Baw Khut, Hoya, and Hubaw.

During 2025, a total of seven (7) local development projects were successfully implemented with a total budget of MMK 409,698,700. These projects included the construction of the Maese Nam wooden bridge, fixing of a 3-mile section of the Nat Taung Junction–Htoo Chaung road, built office building for the judiciary, and emergency repairs to the BP-13 road.


## (B)The finance Sub-department

The Finance Sub-department carried out activities such as budget preparation, budget allocation, and field monitoring to ensure the systematic of financial management.

For the 2025 budget circle, the Karenni State Interim Parliament approved an estimated revenue of 104,367,482 Baht and expenditures of 337,587,989 Baht.

A total fund of 72,918,821 Baht was allocated to departments and related organizations for the year 2025. To monitor the monthly operational expenses of Township Administrative Councils, to allocate the budget for local development, and carry out financial record and accounting activities, the field visits were also conducted.

## (C)Taxation Sub-department

The Taxation Sub-department serves as a key driving force for revenue and carries out taxation-related activities, including drafting tax policies, setting tax rates, and collecting taxes. During 2025, the total revenue collected from taxation are MMK 255,546,202.5 and THB 6,729,7464.38.

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## Department of Justice

The Department of Justice carries out legal affairs with the objectives of supporting the legislative, executive, and judicial pillars; to implement the rule of law; and to establish a fair and accessible justice system for the public. The department undertakes legal activities in accordance with these objectives:

- (a) To support the establishment of an independent and fair judicial pillar.
- (b) Assist in ensuring that decisions are made independently according to the law.
- (c) Ensure that the public has access to the legal rights under the law.
- (d) Support and strengthen the rule of law.

### (A) The Legal Affairs Supervision Sub-department

To support rule of law enforcement and provide legal advisory services, the Legal Supervision Sub-department operates with ( 1 )State Law Office, (2) District Law Offices, and (8) Township Law Offices. In 2025, a total of 153 cases are reported and among of them, 140 cases were completed, while 13 cases are under the ongoing process.

### (B) The Sub-department of Moral Correction and Rehabilitation

The Sub-department of Moral Correction and Rehabilitation manages prison administration in (3) areas: Prison No. (1), Prison No. (2), and one Detention Center. In total 594 prisoners are being held in these prisons and the detention center.

### Department of Trade, Investment, Transport and Communication Department

The Department of Trade, Investment, Transport and Communications (DoTITC) was established to promote economic development, ensuring the smooth and efficient flow of goods, transport, and communication in Karenni State.

During the 2025 fiscal year, despite various challenges, the department collaborated with business operators to implement and promote trade and investment.

#### (A) The Trade Sub-Department

The Trade Sub-department works to ensure the systematic flow of goods within the state. Its key responsibilities include registering export–import businesses, issuing transport permits, and recording trade volumes. During 2025, the department registered 37 export–import traders and issued 69 business permits related to minerals, pearls, fuel, and machinery/vehicles. In addition, 1,388 transport permits for minerals and 109 general permits for pearls, fuel, and machinery/vehicles were issued.

For the annual trade (export/import): exports included 11,726 tons of Tungsten-Tin Mine and 295 tons of antimony. Imports included 328.5 tons of pearls and 1,680 barrels of fuel. Vehicle movement records at border checkpoints showed 1,524 vehicles passing through the BP-13 checkpoint, 764 vehicles through the BP-14 checkpoint, and 646 vehicles passing through the Myitsone checkpoint.


#### (B) The Investment Sub-department

To promote investment sector development, the department carried out registration for companies, businesses, and vehicle registration services. During the year, 3 companies were officially allowed to register. Moreover, a sand mining business in Mawchee and a hotel and tourism business in Demoso were registered. Under the vehicle registration program, 15 commercial vehicles were also registered.

## (C) The Transportation and Communication Sub-department

The Transport and Communications Sub-department carried out activities related to transportation and communication, which included issuing vehicle licenses and providing passenger transport service by road and water. In a year, the department issued 201 vehicle licenses for cars, 155 licenses for motorcycles, and issued 5 driver's licenses.

Furthermore, transport services were organized to facilitate easier travel for the public and government departments.





# Interim Executive Council Department of Women and Child Affairs

## Department of Women and Child Affairs

The Department of Women and Child affairs has been implementing programs that benefit women and children in accordance with the policies, guidelines, and provisions set out in the plans of the Karenni State Interim Executive Council (IEC).

During 2025, the department prioritized internal management, staff capacity building, and the delivery of public services. Under the emergency support program, assistance was provided to 73 pregnant and breastfeeding mothers. In addition, 50 internally displaced persons (IDPs) returning to their places of origin received nutritional support and travel costs. Support was provided to 26 injured children and 4 women who are the victim of airstrikes carried out by the military council. In addition, 27 children requiring urgent medical treatment received financial assistance for their medical expenses.

Furthermore, the 1,000 households affected by flooding received emergency cash assistance, tarpaulins, blankets, clothing, and women's personal hygiene.

The Department of Women and Child also provided financial support to 120 mothers with children who are serving in the IEC departments.

### (A) The Women and Gender Sub-department

The Women and Gender Sub-department carried out the following activities to promote women's safety, development, and protection from violence.

#### Support for Vulnerable Groups

Assistance was provided to **52 women and 9 children who experienced various forms of violence**, including **health care, psychosocial support, and travel expenses for legal proceedings**. Medical expenses were also supported for **women and elderly people who were injured by airstrikes, heavy weapons, and affect landmines**.

#### Support for CDM Families

Support was also provided to servant of the military council and their family members who were detained by revolutionary forces. Necessary assistance, travel expenses, and personal items were provided during the temporary detention process.

## **(B) The Child Affairs Sub-department**

The following activities were carried out to promote the development and protection of children.

Assistance was provided to 26 children who were killed or injured due to airstrikes. Support was also provided to 25 children who required emergency treatment and 7 children with additional needs.

In addition, newborn Kits were distributed to 311 pregnant and breastfeeding mothers, and monthly nutritional support was provided to 515 preschool children in Hoya, Hpasauing, Demoso, and Mese townships. A total of 303 newborn Kits were distributed across each township in Karenni State.

"Two preschools, **"Shwe Phu Pwint Preschool"** and **"Ar Man Thit Preschool"**, were designated as model preschools. Support was provided for school building renovations and financial support to teachers.

Monthly stipends were arranged for more than 30 preschool teachers in Mese Township and 6 teachers from Hpasauing Township. In addition, over 200 teachers received ECCD (Early Childhood Care and Development) training.

Furthermore, parenting awareness training and child rights and child protection training were conducted in villages and IDP camps in Deephaung Khu, Loik Nan Hpa, Kay Lyar, Mese, Phunt Baw Khut, Hoya, and Somo Hpe So Lay areas. During the year, a total of 15 child-related cases, including sexual exploitation and sexual abuse, were addressed in collaboration with the relevant departments.



## **(C) Research and Data Management Sub-department**

In the research sector, the department collaborated with AIT School to conduct a training on data collection for Gender-Based Violence (GBV) research. Following the training, 10 researchers collected data in five locations.

Data of pregnant women, breastfeeding mothers, elderly persons, and preschool children were collected. In addition, the department carried out Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) to review its program implementation.

The Department of Women and Child will continue working in cooperation with partner organizations, local authorities, and the public to ensure the protecting and promoting of the rights of women and children in Karenni State.

## Providing Materials

Women's personal items, such as sanitary pads, underwear, and other necessities, were distributed to 1,408 women-headed households. In addition, 200 women-headed households affected by flooding received emergency cash assistance in the amount of 200,000 kyats per each.

## GBV Case Management

During 2025, a total of 52 Gender-Based Violence (GBV) cases were reported and handled in collaboration with the relevant departments and committees. Among these cases, 40% were domestic violence cases, 21% were sexual violence cases, and 13% were rape cases.

To strengthen GBV prevention and response efforts, the township-level GBV response committees for the temporary were established in 9 townships, including Demawso, Hpruso, Hpasauing, and Bawlakhe.

## Laws and Policies

The **Prevention of Violence Against Women Law (Draft)** has been drafted and submitted to the Law Review Committee. In addition, the **Federal Gender Policy(Draft)** is also currently in the process.

## Capacity Building Training

Capacity-building training was provided to 60 women leaders, and GBV case management training was conducted for 31 police officers and 71 soldiers.

The Diploma Course Batch (1), referred to as the Karenni Women Academy, is conducted with 21 female students.

# Department of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation

The Department of Agriculture, Livestock, and Irrigation is implementing activities during 2025 to ensure food security, promote the production of safe agricultural products, and improve the income and benefits of farmers in Karenni State. The department adopted relevant policies and carried out activities based on the following objectives,

- To ensure food security in Karenni State, develop policies to implement related to the production of nutritious agricultural and livestock products.
- To help farmers gain better profits, crop varieties, farming systems, designated cultivation methods, and agricultural techniques.
- To promote the widespread use of eco-friendly agricultural inputs in the agricultural sector of Karenni State, providing technical support and repairing and maintenance of dams, irrigation canals, as needed.

### (A) The Agricultural Technology Sub-department

The Agricultural Technology Sub-department carried out activities in line with farmers' needs, including the production and distribution of agricultural inputs, the growth of agricultural technology, seed production, demonstration of Model crop plots, and organizing farmer conferences.

Under the input production and distribution program, 5,000 bags of organic fertilizer were produced, 6,000 perennial seedlings and paddy seeds covering 318 acres were distributed to farmers.

In the agricultural technology growth sector, the department conducted one staff capacity-building training with 10 participants. There were 20 technical training sessions across 6 townships and 6 policy sharing sessions. For seed production and model demonstration activities, 5 seed production farms were set up in 3 townships, along with 13 model demonstration plots.

Furthermore, in cooperation with the Karenni State Farmers Union (KSFU), 7 farmer conferences were organized across 6 townships to identify the challenges of farmers and gather information into the policy development.

## (B) The Livestock and Veterinary Sub-department

The Livestock and Veterinary Sub-department carried out animal disease prevention and veterinary treatment as follows.

- Vaccines were provided to 3,208 cattle/buffaloes, 5,865 pigs, 30,285 traditional chickens, and 600 dogs under the vaccination program.
- 255 cattle/ buffaloes were treated for foot-and-mouth disease, wounds, and nutritional support, 294 pigs received deworming treatment and castrating services under the veterinary treatment program.
- 15 livestock technical training sessions were conducted.
- Basic livestock veterinary training was also provided 3 times for 30 trainees from 7 townships, pto become community-based animal health workers.



## (C) The Irrigation Sub-department

The Irrigation Sub-department maintains and repairs to ensure enough water availability for agriculture and flood prevention.

Under the irrigation canal and water infrastructure repair project, the department repairs Nan San Phu Stream, Daw Ta Ngu Stream, Kweing Ngan Stream, Se Su Bo diversion gate, and Hso Phaler Kho dam in- Loik Nan Hpa Township, as well as Anun Stream in Dee Phaung Khu Township and Reservoir No. (7) in Demoso Township.

In addition, trade roads and bridges were repaired and constructed, including (Solya Ku Road ) in Kaylar Township, (Lel Wine and Nan Hpai Bridge) in Pekhoh Township, and (Doh Saw Kalaw–Sobohhae Road) in Loi Nan Hpa Township.

## Department of Construction

The Department of Construction was established on 27 November 2024 and has been implementing construction sector activities in accordance with the policies of the Karenni State Interim Executive Council (IEC), as well as the policies of the Department of Construction.

To support social and livelihood development in Karenni State, the department has worked in coordination with relevant departments and township authorities to conduct field assessments, monitor projects, and mobilize funds for projects that address the actual needs on the ground.


Based on the budget, the following projects were successfully implemented during 2025.

### Road Construction

The Department of Construction completed the road repair process of the Htoo Chaung–Thara Taung–Bu Kho road, which is a total distance of 24 miles.

The department carried out sand surfacing for a 4,070-foot hospital road, constructed a concrete road section measuring 850 feet × 9 feet × 4 inches, and built 4 pipe culvert bridges.

Furthermore, maintenance and repair works were conducted for the Yusa Moso–Kweing Ngai road, approximately 2 miles long. On the Kweing Ngani–Moso road, construction of 1,550 feet of road surfacing, 185 feet of stone paving, and 2 sections of concrete road for 800 feet. Putting stone and sand surfacing on roads was carried out for the Zay Si Pin Road.



## Bridge and Building Construction Works

Under the bridge construction program, the Mae Sae Nam bridge, 60 feet × 14 feet × 10-foot was constructed in Mese Township. Under the building construction project, (2) bomb shelters and other building works were constructed for the Karenni State Police Department.

Works were carried out, including landslide removal at the BP-13 checkpoint, Digging drainage canals, and the construction of a retaining wall measuring 120 feet × 10 feet × 10 feet.

# Department of Youth Affairs

The main objective of the Department of Youth Affairs is to strengthen connections among young people based on the Karenni State Youth Policy, and to effectively implement on the empowerment activities for youth under the guidance of the Interim Executive Council.

The key responsibilities of the Department of Youth Affairs include,

- I. Implementing the Youth Policy in practice.
- II. Promoting cooperation and collaboration among youth groups.
- III. Documenting the voices and perspectives of young people and developing relevant action plans to meet their needs.

## (A) The Youth and Politics Affairs Sub-department

To raise political awareness among young people, activities were carried out in coordination with UKSY, including a campaign opposing the sham election in 7 townships. In addition, the department hosts at least 8 consultation meetings with local ethnic youth, youth from displaced areas, and students to gather their perspectives. Political awareness training for youth was also conducted in 4 townships.

## (B) The Youth and Development Sub-department

A statewide youth survey was conducted across townships, and the collected data are currently on the process of being analyzed to develop appropriate programs and policies. A friendship football competition was organized for 32 township club teams, and able to form a Karenni State-level football team. In the technology sector, computer training courses were conducted in Mese Township in collaboration with KPPA.

## (C) The Youth and Rehabilitation Sub-department

The Youth and Rehabilitation Sub-department is currently developing its program plans, selecting a location, and conducting fundraising for setting up a Rehabilitation Center.

## The Department of Defense

The Department of Defense is officially formed on 29 July 2025 to protect and safeguard the lives and properties of civilians within the Karenni state, while working to minimize the impacts of ongoing armed conflicts, counterattack, and prevent potential threats for people.

The main objective of the Department of Defense is to implement security and defense activities in line with established policies, strengthen cooperation among revolutionary forces, and support the future establishment of a federal army under the control of the civilian government.

The department was structured into five Sub-departments to operate. They are- Office management and finance Sub-department, Weapons Maintenance and Supervision Sub-department, Military Public Relations Sub-department, Intelligence Sub-department, and the Military Ethics and monitoring Sub-department.

## Coordinating with the Karenni Joint Chiefs of Staff(JCS)

Coordinating with the Karenni Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS), the Department of Defense is developing the financial policy leading to transparency, managing the military expenditure into more systematic manner, and cooperating in the drone military operation. In addition, the department visiting to relevant stakeholders in the ground to strengthen coordination and engagement for unity of the Joint forces.

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
